#### From the Principal, Karen DeCosty, '93

St. Pius X has always shared our academic focus and success. Our ACT scores are above the national average and hold strong annually. There is one area St. Pius X does well that is not measurable and that is soft skills.

Soft skills are also known as transferable skills or personal skills. Soft skills are less specialized to a vocation. They are more aligned with a person's personality, disposition, intuition, and attitude.

During our back to school meetings, the faculty focused on several areas of discussion. We went over student data, began the next phase of converting our curriculum into an Understanding by Design format, presented information on teen suicide and why our mission of "care and concern" is so important, and, lastly, created a list of soft skills we feel are important for our students.

The soft skills the faculty and staff chose to help our Lancers develop are:

- Communication (verbal/nonverbal/body language, listening)
- Problem Solving (time management, adaptability, self-regulation)
- Interpersonal and Intrapersonal Skills (collaboration, leadership, relating to yourself and others, self-confidence, taking responsibility for actions)

St. Pius X will continue to work hard to keep our academics current and rigorous, to develop faith and soft skills, and to make sure we stay committed to helping our teens strengthen their mind, body, and soul.

All are volunteers deeply committed to the belief that tuition assistance is an investment in young people who hold the promise of tomorrow.

The LEAP Board oversees an endowment which funds a portion of tuition assistance each school year at St. Pius X High School. Their primary responsibility is to grow the endowment and work to preserve the principal fund through careful management.

"I like that I can feel at home at St. Pius X. Because I spend so much time here, I'm glad that I am able to feel comfortable and welcomed in this environment."


## Alexis Lowery – September

# Theology & Campus Ministry


From Chaplain Rev. Thomas Vordtriede

Near the end of last school year, I found myself blessing rosaries and scapulars in the 1st grade classrooms of Holy Infant School when my phone rang. I noticed that the caller was Bishop Rivituso, so I quickly ducked into a private room and took the call. The Auxiliary Bishop is not in the habit of calling to catch up, and so I knew before he even spoke that I would be receiving a new assignment. To my great joy, I was not only given a new parish; I was also being asked to minister at St. Pius X High School in Festus.

Shortly after that phone call, I began to reflect on my days as a student at St. Louis University High, and I came to the conclusion—as I have time and time again—that my years in high school were a time of immense growth in faith and character in the midst of many academic, social, and moral challenges. I also had a lot of fun then, but there was always a pressing interior need to find and follow a path toward my future. On the surface, I had a blast running track, leading the Pro-Life Club, avoiding yearbook meetings that I was supposed to attend, and hanging out with friends. But all the while I was unsettled by my grades, my desire to be part of something bigger than myself, and my uncertainty of what comes next.

Were it not for the example and kindness of my mentors on the faculty—several of whom were priests—I would have departed high school less formed and more confused about my future. The priests, in particular, showed me that a life of sacrifice is the only way to be truly joyful, and when I began to hear God calling me to their way of life, their support and insights were indispensable. I simply hope that God will work through me to teach the faith and mentor students to discover their vocation...just like he used those high school priests of mine!

Since beginning my ministry at St. Pius X just a few months ago, I have thoroughly enjoyed getting to know both students and faculty. In addition to offering a weekly Mass in the chapel and frequent All School Masses in the gym, I am blessed to have my office in the main hallway, so I always get to interact with everyone between classes, at lunch, and after school. It has been a privilege to attend several football games on the sidelines, and I have already been honored to hear confessions and have substantive conversations about Church teaching, the sacraments, and vocational discernment. As I continue to get more settled, I can only reflect on how blessed I am to serve a community that has been so welcoming to me.





# FALL SPORTS RECAP

Boys Soccer: Ranked fifth in Missouri in Class 2A in an October poll and ended with a 15-6 record, including an overtime win over defending state champion Priory (2-1). A balanced scoring attack was led by Carter Easter (18 goals), Dalton Coomes (13) and Tyler Hedtkamp (12). Carter Easter, Dalton Coomes, Jax Byington, John Herrell (HM), Tyler Hedtkamp (HM) were 1st team all-district choices. Carter Easter, Dalton Coomes, Brendan Otec were JCAA All Conference 1st team and 2nd team choices were Jax Byington and John Herrell.

**Football:** 8-3 season included a thrilling 18-14 opening round district playoff win over Kelly before ending the season with a loss at Charleston. The offense averaged 35.2 points per game while the defense had a pair of shutouts and limited opponents to 18.4 points per contest. Senior Jalen Thornton was selected as a 1st team all-I55 Conference performer at wide receiver and second teamer as a defensive back, junior Dre Townsend was 1st team offense as an all-around player on offense and 2nd team at defensive back, while seniors Dustin Burch (running back) and Luke Comparato (defensive line) rounded out the team's 1st team All-Conference choices.

**Volleyball:** Started the season by winning the Windsor Tournament. The two time defending state champions, who currently have seven alumni playing volleyball in college, worked several freshmen into the varsity rotation and finished the regular season at 12-8-2, ending a remarkable run of consecutive state tournament final four appearances that started in 2011. Kaylee Portell capped her Lancer career with a 1st team all-district selection and by making the All-State team for the second straight year.

**Cross Country:** The team had another strong showing this year, highlighted by sophomore Rita Eimer's return to the state championship meet, where she finished 27th in Class 2, improving on her 58th place result as a freshman.

Girls Tennis: Overcame some injury issues to post a perfect 14-0 season (first time in program history) and qualified for sectionals for the second straight year. Suzie Wilson took 1st place and Lily Bollman, exchange student, 2nd in individual district play.

**Softball:** Final record of 10-10-1. Highlights include winning the Notre Dame (St. Louis) Tournament and a second place finish in the Barb Charboneau Invitational. Sophomore AJ Agers was a 1st team All-Region selection as a pitcher.

Cheer & Dance: The Lancer Dancers attended the National Dance Alliance event over the summer and earned the following team awards — a Superior rating and Gold for the Team Dance in the Circle of Winners. The team received bids to Nationals and to Disney, and Brenna Mickey and Monica Barton made the NDA all-American Team.

# **Facility Updates**

We work hard every day to provide our young men and women with the very best education possible. Learning not only takes place in the classroom, it happens all around campus. With this in mind, we have made the following renovations which are important as they are some of the most commonly used spaces throughout the campus. Thank you to the SPX community for your generous and loyal support which made these renovations possible.

Donations from individuals, volunteer hours and The Fund for St. Pius X provided funding for these projects.

With the Lancers passing on their traditions of excellence within their programs and inspiring the players of tomorrow in the stands, the future continues to be bright for St. Pius X athletics.



**Ralph Boyer Gymnasium:** In the spring of 2018, the gym was repainted and the window treatments were updated. The Business Alliance signs were replaced with a digital display for signage and announcements. The funds raised during the Legacy Gala were used to purchase a new floor covering system for non-athletic events in the gym.



**School Building Second and Third Floor:** Excess lockers were removed in favor of a seating area. Wall chargers for mobile devices were added. The hall flooring was replaced on third floor.



**Annex Lower Level:** Three storage areas were converted into a club room, meeting space and an office. One room will be home to the Robotics program.



Tennis: The courts were resurfaced to remedy 550 feet of cracks.



**Baseball Field:** The old backstop was torn out and is being replaced with a new one with galvanized poles and a concrete short wall. Dugouts were also repainted.



**Dan Bokern Soccer Field:** The soccer field has a new watering system. It was also reseeded across the field and resodded in sections. A shipping container was acquired for storage, was painted, and will serve as the base for an announcer's booth and scorer's table for next season.



"I work for a non-profit, The Leatherback Trust (leatherback.org). I live and work in Costa Rica on a sea turtle monitoring project. I also worked with sea turtles in Greece with a project called Archelon. This is a project I strongly suggest students participate in after they graduate from SPX. There are so many things to learn from volunteering broad for this organization."



Quintin is currently living in Costa Rica where he is studying critically endangered sea turtles. The goal of his research is to gain better insights into the biogeography of the hawksbill sea turtles using satellite transmitters. This experience is preparing him for a career in Marine Conservation Biology.

Quintin came back during Homecoming week and gave a presentation to the Biology and Spanish classes on sea turtles and marine biology. He also provided advice to our current students on making the transition from high school to college.



In the 2017-2018 school year, St. Pius X students participated in three events at the MSHAA speech competition.
